Thesis Title A Transformational Approach to the Question in French

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ABSTRACT

This thesis provides a structural description of the question in French. This description is provided in the form of a series of rules by means of which acceptable questions may be "generated" in French. These rules are of two types: phrase structure rules by means of which strings of morphemes are provided and transformation rules which provide the means for rewriting the morpheme strings so that acceptable questions will be the result.

The transformational theory developed by Chomsky<sup>1</sup> is used in this study. The justification for the use of this approach is that it is believed that it provides a simpler, more nearly complete, and more explicit explanation of the structure of the question in French than is provided by any other approach.
